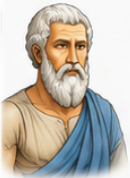
Conclusion

Rising sea levels, earthquakes and tectonic shifts may have submerged ancient civilizations and inspired such legends.

3. MEMORY IN MYTH

Plato's account may preserve a distant memory of a real advanced culture.

WHY ATLANTIS IS CONSIDERED A LEGEND



1. NO ARCHAEOLOGICAL EVIDENCE
Despite global searches, no verified remains of Atlantis have been found.



2. PHILOSOPHICAL ALLEGORY
Plato likely used Atlantis as a moral story to warn against arrogance, imperialism and moral decline.



3. CHRONOLOGICAL ISSUES
Plato dated Atlantis ~9,000 years before Solon's time, which does not match historical records.

POSSIBLE INSPIRATION: THERA (SANTORINI) ERUPTION



- One of the largest volcanic eruptions in human history (~1600 BCE).
 - Destroyed the Minoan civilization.
 - Tsunamis affected the Aegean world.
 - May have inspired the Atlantis legend.
